

Welcome to Festival America - inaugural London edition, September 2018

We live in dark times. The world appears to be dislocating, with new forces in power and new allegiances being formed at both high and grassroots levels. As Britain continues its preparations for Brexit and the world appears to be retreating from its hard-won 20th century compact, our relationships with Europe and the Americas remain crucial for writers, readers, and audiences alike, the entire fragile global ecosystem of literature. 2018, therefore, is the ideal moment for London to provide a satellite for the much-lauded Festival America, founded in Vincennes in 2002. A large group of writers from across the continent will visit their French publishers and readers, and we are delighted that a contingent will travel on to London.

The range of voices and themes is exceptionally rich. There is darkness, dystopia and despair, from authors such as Michael Farris Smith, John Vigna, Cherie Dimaline and Jennie Melamed; there is crime, poverty and systemic collapse, from authors such as Tommy Orange, Omar El Akkad, Ivy Pochoda and Andrée Michaud. But there are also moments of high comedy from Patrick DeWitt, Nathan Hill, Ben Markowits and Jonathan Ames, and lighter-hearted, serious-minded narratives from Heather O'Neill and Emma Hooper.

Society, the role of women and the American Dream are under scrutiny from Brad Watson, Nancy Lee, Kelleigh Greenberg-Jephcott, Brit Bennett and Sarah Churchwell. For sheer narrative arabesques and invention look no further than four exceptional Canadian writers Christian Guay-Poliquin, Guillaume Morissette, Eric Plamondon and Michael Redhill.

And for serious weight and a historical view, we have the much-garlanded Canadian champion author Guy Vanderhaeghe, as well as the announcement of the Cundill Prize for History at a gala event headlined by British historian Peter Frankopan, and we welcome the outstanding Académie Française member Dany Laferrière, whose novel *The Enigma of the Return* encapsulates the exile's perpetual paradox.

With the support of our UK, US, Canada, Québec and French partners we are looking forward to a magical few days around Trafalgar Square in late September. Do join us.

Celebrating the launch of Tommy Orange's début novel







Investigating language as the basis of culture

Guillaume Morissette, Christian Guay-Poliquin and Cherie Dimaline




Guillaume Morissette is a young and dynamic Québécois author whose new book The Original Face tells the story of a struggling digital artist facing up to the anxieties of the internet age. Christian Guay-Poliquin, also from Québec, is the author of Running on Fumes, which was recently translated into English - a disquieting tale of survival set in an apocalyptic Canada without electricity. They will be in conversation with Georgian Bay Métis author Cherie Dimaline whose first novel The Marrow Thieves is a dystopia centered on the Indigenous peoples of North America – a deeply symbolic story in which the Natives are the only people who retain the ability to dream. These three authors all master language to express different ideas and themes, and they will discuss the impact of language on culture.

Brad Watson is a much-admired and widely read American author from the South. His life story itself is almost a novel, and he has written short stories and longer narratives over the course of many decades. Miss Jane, which was shortlisted for the Wellcome Prize Award in 2017, is an exceptionally beautiful and moving narrative of a girl child born without defining sex characteristics at the beginning of the 20th century, meaning that marriage and childbearing – the two roles deemed suitable for women – were closed to her. This novel explores the nature of gender, sexuality, society, community and nature in the context of the USA throughout the last century.

Sarah Churchwell is Professor of American Literature and Public Understanding at the University of London and, most recently, the author of Behold America: A History of America First and the American Dream.

These two exceptional writers will discuss the great American 20th Century and how women such as Miss Jane contributed to it, and how it shaped them.

Sarah Churchwell is Professor in American Literature and Chair of Public Understanding of the Humanities at the School of Advanced Study, University of London. Mark Gilbert is Professor of History and International Studies at the Bologna campus of the School for Advanced International Studies (SAIS) of the Johns Hopkins University. Gilbert is associate editor of the Journal of Modern Italian Studies and is a frequent commentator on Italian and European politics.

Emma Hooper is an author, musician and academic. Her debut novel, *Etta and Otto and Russell and James*, has been published in 23 territories and 18 languages. Her next book, *Our Homesick Songs*, will be published by Penguin Canada in 2018. Her viola-accordion-saw-and-loop-pedal solo act Waitress For The Bees has earned her a Finnish Cultural knighthood and her quartet Stringbeans have performed with Peter Gabriel, The Heavy, Newton Faulkner and many others. She teaches pop-music sociology at Bath Spa university. Although Emma lives in the UK, she visits home in Alberta to cross-country ski as often as she can.

Leslie Hurtig is the Artistic Director of the Vancouver Writers Fest. She was born into a house of books and has made her career from various points within Canada's book industry. Hurtig has worked for some of Canada's best bookstores, acted as a sales representative and publicist for some of North America's great publishers, and worked as a foreign rights and contracts manager at Raincoast Books. She sat on the Vancouver Writers Fest's Board of Directors for 18 years, filling many roles. When not at work, Leslie can be found at play with her three sons, two cats, one dog and husband.

Dany Laferrière

On 12th December 2013 Dany Laferrière was appointed to the Académie française. Laferrière was born in Port-au-Prince and spent his childhood with his grand-mother in Petit-Goâve. In 1976 he fled dictatorship in Haïti to go to Québec, where he started to write, working on his first novel *How to Make Love to a Negro without being Tired* (1985). His *American Autobiography* soon made him the representative of a generation which would revolutionize the writing of fiction.

In 2018 he published *Autoportrait de Paris avec Chat*; a 320-page book which was entirely hand-drawn. In total Laferrière has published 30 books that have been translated into more than 15 languages.

Lee's work has been published in the U.K., France, Germany, Spain, Italy and the Netherlands. She has served as Visiting Canadian Fellow for the University of East Anglia, as well as Writer-in-Residence for Historic Joy Kogawa House, the City of Richmond and the Ville de Vincennes, France. A dedicated creative writing teacher, Nancy has taught fiction writing to students of all ages and backgrounds in Canada, the U.K. and France, and now holds the position of Assistant Professor in Creative Writing at the University of British Columbia. She is also the co-creator of the popular three-part EdX online education series, How to Write a Novel.

Antonia Maioni

Antonia Maioni is the Dean of Arts at McGill University, which runs the Cundill History Prize. As Professor in the Department of Political Science and the Institute for Health and Social Policy, she previously served as Associate Vice-Principal for Research and International Relations (2015-2016), and Director of the McGill Institute for the Study of Canada (2001-2011).

Benjamin Markovits grew up in Texas, London and Berlin. He is the author of seven previous novels, including *You Don't Have to Live Like This*, which won the 2015 James Tait Black Prize. Heather O'Neill has written for This American Life and the New York Times. Her first novel, Lullabies for Little Criminals, was shortlisted for the Orange Women's Prize; her second, The Girl who was Saturday Night, was longlisted for the Baileys Women's Fiction Prize, and shortlisted for the Giller Prize.
